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Bear Lake Road Drainage Improvement Project Update

Constructions of improvements on Bear Lake Rd began on October 8, 2007. Construction is expected to be one year in duration and should be completed in October of 2008. The project will add drainage improvements to the roadway that will reduce flooding and will provide water quality to storm runoff from the roadway. We will also be resurfacing the roadway as part of this project. To date, most of the work on this project has consisted of the relocation of the existing water line which is required due to conflicts with the proposed drainage improvements.

There are two water quality ponds that are being constructed as part of this project. This existing retention pond immediately north of Bunnell Road is being reconstructed to transform this facility to a wet pond. This newly reconstructed pond will be able to treat Stormwater runoff from Bear Lake Road before it

outfalls into Bear Lake. Another treatment pond is being constructed in the first section of the outfall ditch leading to Cub Lake from Bear Lake Road. This pond will be able to treat Stormwater runoff from Bear Lake Rd before it enters Cub Lake. The existing outfall pipes that flow into this ditch from Bear Lake and Little Bear Lake will be piped around the proposed pond to avoid any impacts to the stages of those lakes.

The County and the construction contractor understand how important the water quality of Bear Lake is to the community. Therefore, we continue to make erosion and sediment control an important component of the construction of this project.

Urban Turf Fertilizer Rule Good News

The Dept. of Agriculture and Consumer Services (FDACS) issued a new rule pertaining to fertilizer on 12-31-2007. The amount of phosphate and nitrogen contained in urban turf fertilizer is restricted under the new guidelines. According to the FDACS Fact Sheet, "the rule will protect water quality by restricting phosphorous and nitrogen application rates in fertilizers for urban turf and lawns." The directions for use limit the amount of phosphorus and nitrogen for each application and per year. Lawn maintenance companies also must comply. Transition to the new rule for existing fertilizer supplies extends until 7-1-2009 thereafter sales of existing supplies are stopped.

What's New with Weeds and Alum?



How many of you remember when Bear Lake was unusable for boating and swimming? That was in the late 1970s when we had a severe Hydrilla infestation. The Hydrilla was quickly eliminated after the lakefront residents collected donations for grass carp. That solution gave us 25 wonderful years of excellent water quality in a weed-free lake.

How many of you remember the three year period, from April 1996 through April 1999 when our water clarity averaged 16.2' in our weedfree lake? (Thank you Nancy Dunn, and Lakewatch, for your monthly labors.)

Well things have changed a lot and now it's time for another collection from all lakefront residents. Our water clarity averaged only 8' this past summer. The mayflies, indicators of excellent water quality, haven't been seen on our screens now for several years. EVERYONE seems to be complaining about the submerged weeds and the wind-blown algae that stink up our shores.

There are some people who say that submerged weeds are beneficial because they provide a food source for waterfowl, a habitat for fish, and a buffer for erosion. But Bear Lake is not needed to feed waterfowl with so many other weedy lakes in the area. We have the personal experience of living on this weed-free lake for 25 years with no complaints about the fishing. Ask around, fish-



ing has always been good. And we don't have erosion problems. Bear Lake is a unique sand bottom lake where generalizations, like weeds being beneficial, do not apply.

Not only do we not need the submerged weeds for any purpose, we don't want the weeds because they actually pollute the lake! I can quote many peer reviewed scientific papers that agree with the following statement:

"It has been shown that submersed plants mobilize nutrients from the sediment. The nutrient-pumping mechanism results in relocation of nutrients from the sediment to the overlying water. Aquatic plants build and modify lake sediments by the sloughing of leaves and stems. Because decay is rarely complete, organic matter (mud) builds sediment and lakes become shallower."

Why is our water quality getting so bad so quickly? A combination of two things: first is the increased use of fertilizer in our watershed. As more expensive homes replace the old you see many more yards with green St. Augustine lawns than we did 10 years ago. The other is the natural die off of the 25+ year old grass carp. Both of these factors have allowed the filamentous algae that has been growing on the lake bottom for the last few years to get out of control. It covers and smothers much of the filter feeding clams and mussels Bear Lake relies on for its unique water clarity.

Lakes get worse over the years because they store some of the nutrients from the previous year. It's called nutrient recycling and all lakes have it from one degree to another. This is where the upcoming alum treatment comes in. Alum is the only thing proven to prevent this nutrient cycling. It is relatively inexpensive and it works...all the time. We put in a little and it helps a little. We put in a lot and it helps a lot. So be generous. Now it is up to us. Bear Lake is the community's greatest natural resource and its health affects us all. 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Make Your Yard Florida-Friendly

USE THE RIGHT PLANTS FOR YOUR AREA: How can your choice of land-scape plants affect our lakes? Fertilizers and pesticides can make its way from your lawn to lakes through stormwater runoff and groundwater seepage. The water that runs off your property during a storm event makes its way to the lakes.

By choosing plants that are native to this region, you can eliminate the need for watering and for fertilizer and pesticide applications. By removing trees between your house and the lake (for that great view), you take away the vital resourcces which remove huge amounts of nutrients from the groundwater before they reach the lakes. This is one of the reasons the Bear Lakes' have been turning green since 1999. Don't remove the trees in your backyards! View the lake through filtered trees and many of you won't have to close your blinds from the direct sun.

Keep the pine-needled, bahia lawns for low maintenance and less nutrients which is what helped to keep the Bear Lakes' clear for so long.

Maintaining turf, particularly St. Augustine lawns, requires huge amounts of irrigation water, fertilizer, and pesticides.

Many people have much larger lawn areas than they need or use. Consider replacing unused lawn areas with native

or other drought-tolerant species.

HANDLE LAWN DEBRIS PROPERLY: Leaves, grass clippings and other yard waste c contain nutrients such as phosphorous and nitrogen. When these materials enter the lakes, the nutrients they contain lead to the degradation of the water quality. Follow the tips below to help protect water quality. You may also find you can spend less on fertilizers because you will be recycling nutrients your lawn and shrubs need to thrive!

- Never blow leaves, grass clippings, sand or other debris into the street.
 The streets drain directly to our lakes and these materials will be carried in with the stormwater.
- Leaves make excellent (and free)
 mulch and can be used to enrich the
 soil in your flower beds and planters.
 Excess leaves can be bagged and
 placed at the curb for pick up on your
 lawn waste pick up day.
- Grass clippings can be mulched back into your turf to recycle the nutrients they contain. Any clippings that end up on the street, sidewalk, driveway, should be swept or raked and used as mulch or bagged for pick up.
- If you use a lawn service, make sure they are aware of and follow these guidelines. Do you know what your lawn service provider is doing with

your grass clippings when you are not around?

ELIMINATE OR MINIMIZE CHEMICAL

USE: Chemicals we apply to our lawns and homes to make our plants grow or to control pests can have unintended impacts on our environment. Nutrients in fertilizers can fuel unwanted algae growth in the lakes. Herbicides and insecticides can harm beneficial plants and wildlife when used improperly. When you have to use these products, please help prevent unneccessary pollution by following these tips: 1) use chemicals accordingly to the label instructions; 2) never exceed the label rates for any chemical. More is not usually better and can often be harmful to you or the environment; 3) dispose of unwanted material according to the label; 4) treat only the areas that are in need; 5) if variable rates are given, try the lower dose first, and 6) clean up spills and sweep excess fertilizers off of any paved surfaces.

2008: WHAT'S OUT?

St. Augustine lawns that need frequent watering to survive and removing trees around the lake that take up the nutrients in their roots before entering the lake through groundwater infiltration

WHAT'S IN? Bahia and zoysia lawns that can tolerate drought; Florida-friendly plants that use less water, have few pests, and are easy to maintain.







The following Lakewatch data covers the last 10 months. Clarity level is the average of four locations on Big Bear Lake and three locations on Little Bear Lake and Cub Lake. Lake levels determined by surveyed elevation markers set on the lakes by Seminole County.

Conversion from the National Geodetic Vertical Datum of 1929 (NGVD29) to the North American Vertical Datum of 1988 (NAVD88) was completed in Seminole county February 19, 2007.

The conversion factor is -1.031. The Bear Lakes' gauges were re-surveyed by the County in Feburary 2007.

Although Bear Lake is at 13' water clarity this month, the water is very "green" compared to 10 years ago and algae in the lake recede with cooler temperatures.


